Consultation Process in the West Midlands

The Vision and Issues – 14 weeks including 3 stakeholder events

Strategy & Implementation Plan – 9 week targeted programme

The top 5 issues, in rank order, raised by respondents were:

- 1. Environmental/emission/carbon reduction issues
- 2. Improve safety and security on public transport
- 3. Improve bus service frequency/routes/reliability/fares (hard)
- 4. Road based public transport issues (capacity/reduce congestion/bus priority measures)
- 5. Improve accessibility of public transport for less able users/social inclusion











Local Authorities

- A series of formal and informal meetings were held with various Officers and Members from each District
- Presentations were made to appropriate Committees, as identified by each District Stakeholders

Key Stakeholders

- A list of Stakeholders was complied from records of previously engaged LTP consultees and from databases held by a number of organisations
- •This covered a total range of 300 local authorities, statutory agencies, businesses, voluntary and community groups, local councillors, MPs and Peers, and equality groups

General Public

- •A self-completion questionnaire was appended to copies of the Summary Document
- An internet-based version of the questionnaire was located on the LTP website
